Will the Minister for Energy (Power Division) be pleased to state the details of steps taken / being taken by the Government to enhance the system of transmission lines in the country?

Mr. Khurram Dastagir Khan: For Improvement of transmission system reliability and enhancement of existing transmission capacity, the NTDC management has taken the following measures based on incorporating latest technological trends being adopted worldwide:

- i. Ultra-High Voltage (UHV) level of 765 kV is being implemented in NTDC network with the help of funding from World Bank (WB), in order to enhance the capacity of transmission lines at 500 kV and 220 kV levels.
- ii. Reconductoring of existing transmission lines to enhance capacity and avoid overloading:
 - (a) Replacement of existing 220 kV Tarbela-Burhan D/C transmission line with a new line on twin bundled Rail conductor Circuits-I & II (in bidding phase).
 - (b) Reconductoring of 220 kV Gatti-Bandala T/L (near completion).

- (c) Restrengthening of 220 kv Sheikhpura-Ravi & Atlas-Ravi T/L (completed)
- iii. NTDC is introducing Series Compension technology on transmission lines. In this context, NTDC has hired services of DAR Engineering to conduct feasibility studies as independent consultants. The report has been submitted and is under review.
- iv. NTDC also experimented and rolled out the use of HVIC/RTV coating on transmission line insulators in the South region, which has greatly reduced the number of tripping events.
- v. Recently, installation works of digitalized distance relays and event fault happening recorders was carried out in the South region to reduce tripping events.
- vi. To ensure transmission of bulk power at long distances, HVDC system has been introduced in the network at 500kV and 600kV voltage levels. In this context, the following one (01) mega project (CASA-1000) is under construction while Matiari-Lahore) 600 kV HVDC project is already completed:
 - (a) Sangtuda (Tajiskistan)-Noeshera 500 kV HVDC (CASA-1000) project

Moreover, the details of transmission line construction & shunt reactor installation projects completed in the last 3 ½ years & future transmission line projects is attached at **Annex-I** and **Annex-II** respectively.

Will the Minister for Energy (Power Division) be pleased to state:

- (a) *whether it is a fact that PSDP funds have been allocated for transmission line from Karachi to Lasbela, if so, its year-wise details during the last five years; and*
- (b) *the mode of utilization of these funds, indicating also the present status of completion / progress of work on the said transmission line?*

Mr. Khurrum Dastagir Khan: (a) • During last five years, PSDP funds have not been allocated to KE for transmission lines from Karachi to Lasbela.

(b) • KE is rehabilitating existing 132kV Transmission-Line from Hub Chowki to Vinder & 66kV Transmission Line from Vinder to Bela grid in phased-manner. Under phase-I, over 97% of the project has been completed and phase-I is expected to be completed by June 2022, while under phase-II, over 92% of the project has been completed and phase-II is expected to be completed by September 2022.

(c) • KE is planning to construct new transmission lines and upgrade grids in Vinder, Uthal & Bela from 66 kV to 132 kV level in order to further strengthen its network in Balochistan region as part of KE's investment plan. In this respect, project plan was shared with Government of Balochistan. However, the project's execution is delayed owing to approval of Right of Way (RoW) from the Government of

Balochistan and other agencies. KE team is rigorously following up with GoB officials for the necessary approvals.

- The above project will significantly help to improve reliability of power supply in the region and to fulfil future load demand in the region.
- Despite above challenges, KE is geared-up to complete the project to ensure improved reliability of power supply in the region and seeks support from Provincial and Federal Government on the matter.

Mr. Azam Nazeer Tarar: During the period from 2002 to 2013, 182 Government Servants who entered into Plea Bargain. The region-wise details are as under;

Will the Minister for Energy (Power Division) be please to state:

- (a) the names / details of those districts / areas of Balochistan which are deprived of electricity transmission lines / electricity infrastructure at present; and*
- (b) whether there is any proposal under consideration of the Government to earmark any project to install micro-grids in those areas of Balochistan having great potential for renewable energy resources, if so, its details?*

Mr. Khurram Dastagir Khan: (a) • There is no survey/ report available that can clearly depict the exact / approximate district wise ratio of area of each district of Balochistan which are deprived of facility of electricity. However, a survey/ feasibility study can be conducted jointly with the survey department Government of Balochistan to determine the exact ratio of area having facility of electricity at each district, if funds provided to QESCO for execution of said specific job.

• During last 06 years 7288 number of villages have been electrified in various districts of Balochistan. The year wise breakup is as under:

- o 2016-17 = 1317 Nos.
- o 2017-18 = 2459 Nos.
- o 2018-19 = 1064 Nos.
- o 2019-20 = 819 Nos.
- o 2020-21 = 1023 Nos.
- o 2021-22 = 606 Nos.

The district wise detail of aforementioned villages are attached at **Annex-A.**

- It is pertinent to mention here that, the facility of village electrification can only be provided by QESCO under PSDP, SDGs and MDGs. Therefore, after the identification of Govt. of Balochistan Energy Deptt. the QESCO Project Directorate (Construction) carries out the survey & prepares PC-1 for un-electrified village and after remittance of funds the work executed. So, it all depends upon the flow of funds.

- **3512** Nos. of schemes have been electrified during present government whereas, **1382** Nos. of schemes/works are in progress & expected to be completed within **02** years or so, the detail is at **Annex-B.**

(b) The Government is planning to carry out off-grid village electrification through renewable energy resources southern Balochistan. In this regard, a project for off-grid village electrification of 9 Districts of southern Balochistan is being devised. AEDB has developed the PC-IIs of the project in order to facilitate Energy Department, Government of Balochistan and forwarded the same to Energy Department for further processing. Detailed feasibility study will be carried out under the PC-IIs which will also evaluate the Possibility of developing mini/micro grids in the areas. The PC-I of the project will be developed on the basis of outcomes of the feasibility studies.

***Question No. 6 Senator Samina Mumtaz Zehri:**
(Notice Received on 22/02/2022 at 12:30 PM) QID: 38955

Will the Minister for Energy (Power Division) be pleased to state:

- whether it is fact that average wind speed of 5-7 meters per second, suitable for wind power generation, exists in most of the areas of Balochistan, such as Naushki, Naukundi, Ormara, Turbat, Pasni, Lasbela and Khuzdar, if so;*
- whether there is any proposal under consideration of the Government to build stand alone wind-power units / small wind electric systems connected to isolated systems in order to provide electricity to those areas which are not connected to the national grid?*

Mr. Khurrum Dastagir Khan: (a) As per Wind Atlas of Pakistan, the annual average wind speed in the areas of Naukundi, Ormara, Turbat (Kech), Pasni & Khuzdar is greater than 5 in/s at height of 10m above ground level (agl) which is reasonable for the installation of standalone small scale wind turbine generators. Further, these areas also have good potential of solar energy as well. Whereas, the annual average wind speed in the areas of Lasbela & Naushki is less than 5 m/s at height of 10m agl.

(b) The Government is planning to carry out off-grid village electrification through renewable energy resources in southern Balochistan. In this regard, a project for off-grid village electrification of 9 Districts of southern Balochistan is being devised. The PC-II to carry out

feasibility study to determine the best solutions for electrification depending on the available resources (e.g. standalone installations or micro grids using wind, solar or hybrid systems), is under finalization. The implementation of the project will be carried out under a PC-I to be developed on the basis of outcomes of the feasibility study.

***Question No. 7 Senator Samina Mumtaz Zehri:**

Will the Minister for Energy (Power Division) be pleased to state:

- (a) whether it is a fact that there are lot of areas in the province of Balochistan at present which are not linked with the national or regional grid systems, if so, the details or these areas; and*
- (b) whether there is any proposal under consideration of the Government to build new electricity transmission infrastructure in such areas so that they may be connected with grid systems, if so, its details?*

Mr. Khurram Dastagir Khan: (a) Yes, it a fact that at present there are few areas in the province of Balochistan which are not interconnected/ linked with the national / regional grid system. The detail is as under:

- a. Mekran Region.
- b. Maskhay & its suburbs
- c. Awaran & its suburbs.

Note: *Presently, Mekran Region is getting electricity from Iran in isolation from National Network while Maskhay and Awaran areas are getting electricity from Small Power House operational in these areas.*

(b) Yes, there are concrete plans to connect the aforementioned areas with the national / regional grid network via new 132k Transmission Line network. The detail of the projects are:

a. **Mekran Region:**

- Construction of New 132kV Grid Station at NAG extension of 24 Nos. 132kV Line Bay at Existing Grid stations.
- Construction of new 668 km, 132kV Transmission Lines.
- 335 km, stringing of 2nd Circuit of existing 132kV Transmission Lines.
- Date of Completion = March 2023.

c. **Mashkay:**

- Construction activities of new 132kV Grid Station Mashkay along with 105km, 132kV new Transmission line (N — Mashkay) are in full swing.
- Date of Completion = December 2022.

c. **Awaran:**

- PC-I amounting to PKR 1627.13 M for construction of new 132kV grid station with the allied 90 km 132kV Transmission Line has been prepared and submitted to Govt. Balochistan.

Once, the PC-I is approved, the work will be started & after completion of the project the area will be connected with National / Regional Grid Network.

Will the Minister for Human Rights be pleased to state:

- (a) *the number of children recovered from forced labor during past three years in Islamabad particularly in construction sector and mechanical workshops; and*
- (b) *steps taken by the Government to create child friendly society and meet obligations under United Nations Convention on the Rights of Child (UNCRC)?*

Mian Riaz Hussain Pirzada: (a) The subject of child labour/ child forced labour at ICT / level is dealt by the Ministry of Interior (ICT Administration, Directorate of Labour) and Ministry of Overseas Pakistanis and Human Resource Development. As far as MoHR is concerned, the Child Protection Institute (CPI), established under the Islamabad Capital Territory Child Protection Act 2018, is currently providing protection services to 39 children who were earlier subjected to child labour. Whereas National Commission on the Rights of Child (NCRC), established under the National Commission on the Rights of Child Act, 2017, has addressed 182 complaints pertaining to child rights / abuse related issues all across Pakistan.

(b) Being cognizant of its international obligations under United Nations Convention on the Rights of Child (UNCRC) to create child friendly society, the Government of Pakistan has enforced the following laws to prohibit and discourage child labour:

Federal level:

1. The Mines Act, 1923
2. Children (Pledging of Labour) Act, 1933
3. The Factories Act, 1934
4. Shops and Establishments Ordinance, 1969

Will the Minister for Law and Justice be pleased to state whether it is a fact that as per latest report of the transparency International, the ratio of corruption has increased in the country, if so, the reasons thereof and the steps taken / being taken by the Government to control the same?

Mr. Azam Nazeer Tarar: National Accountability Bureau (NAB) is established under the National Accountability Ordinance ("NAO"), 1999. Being Pakistan's apex anti-corruption organization NAB has been mandated with the responsibility of eradication of corruption through a holistic approach of Awareness, Prevention and Enforcement. It is to inform that CPI is constructed on the basis of 08 x different parameters and NAB's performance has neither been considered nor any data has been obtained from NAB while calculating the Corruption Perception Index (CPI) 2021. Therefore, NAB is not in any position to comment on the reasons and causes of increase in ratio of corruption. However, following facts are being highlighted on the basis of the material available on the website of Transparency International regarding CPI, 2021.

Corruption Perception Index CPI 2021 released by Transparency International ranked Pakistan at 140 in 180 countries. Pakistan's score lowered to 28/100 in 2021 as compared to 31/100 in 2020 and ranked at

140/180 in 2021 in comparison to 124/180 in 2020. As per details of study available on the Transparency International Pakistan's website (Annex-A), total 08 data sources were used to construct the Corruption Perception Index. Pakistan's score reduced as compared to the year 2020 in three parameters *i.e.* Economist Intelligence Unit Country Risk Service 2021, World Economic Forum Executive Opinion Survey 2020 and varieties of Democracy. Resultantly, it's total score was reduced by '3'.

The major fall of score is related to the data source, "The Economist Intelligence Unit Country Risk Service 2021" which dropped from 37 in 2020 to 20 in 2021. This parameter considers the following areas;

- Procedures and accountability governing the allocation and use of public funds
- Public funds misappropriated by ministers/public officials for private or party political purposes
- Special funds for which there is no accountability
- General abuses of public resources
- Professional civil service or large number of officials directly
- appointed by the government
- Independent body auditing the management of public finances
- Independent judiciary with the power to try ministers / public officials for abuses
- Tradition of a payment of bribes to secure contract and gain favours.

The 2nd parameter "The World Economic Forum Executive Opinion Survey 2020" takes into account the following areas;

- Undocumented extra payments or bribes connected with the imports and exports
- Public utilities
- Annual tax payments

- Awarding of public contract and licences
- Obtaining favourable judicial decisions.

Whereas, the 3rd parameter “Varieties of Democracy” takes the average of following Indices / Indicators;

- Public sector corruption index
- Executive corruption index
- The indicator for legislative corruption
- The indicator for judicial corruption.

It is further added that the 08 x sources used to construct the CPI 2021 for Pakistan are mainly the indicators of governance. Whereas the CPI Report 2021 (Annex-B) in its methodology clearly states that the data source used is regularly updated, however, upon scrutiny of 8 data sources used for construction of CPI Report, 2021 it can be concluded that for some data sources old data of 2020 has been used instead of 2021. It is also worth mentioning that as per methodology, data sources selected considers only the assessments of country experts or businesspeople, ignoring the opinion / representation of general public who are the direct respondents / effectees of the phenomenon of corruption. Apparently, corruption perception index which is based on skewed data does not give true picture of the corruption and effectiveness of the measures taken for it's eradication.

Action taken by NAB to eradicate Corruption and future strategies:

In the light of zero tolerance policy towards corruption of the present Government, NAB is striving hard to eradicate corruption through its three pronged strategy of **awareness, prevention and enforcement**.

The *enforcement* regime is not only resulting in recoveries but also creating a deterrence against the menace of corruption. Following is the numerical data in terms of complaints received, processed and recoveries made by NAB for the years 2019, 2020 and 2021;

Under *awareness* regime, NAB has taken concrete steps to create awareness against corruption amongst the society, through following activities:

- TV Talk Shows, Radio Programmes, Walks, Lectures, Seminars, Workshops, Advertisements in leading English / Urdu newspapers, Newsletters, Essay Writing Competitions, Declamation Contests, Poster / Painting Competitions, Character Building of future generation through establishment of character Building Societies (CBS) at schools, colleges and universities level, across the country;
- Publication of procedure for lodging a complaint in NAB on the Bill Boards, Installation of permanent bill boards carrying anti-corruption slogans at prominent points;
- Printing NAB's message on Utility Bills, Dissemination of anti-corruption messages through mobile phone messaging in addition to electronic media;
- Holding of seminars for different segments of societies with active participation of NGOs and UN offices to ensure greater visibility and effectiveness; and
- In commemoration of anti-Corruption day (9th December), holding of different activities i.e. TV Talk Shows, seminars, walks, declamation contests, display of posters / Banners and publication of Special Supplements in the newspapers.

Under *Prevention* Regime NAB has established prevention committees u/s 33-C, NAO to review rules and regulations of Federal as well as Provincial Departments, so as to suggest recommendations in coordination with Departments concerned as prevention committees help to identify ways and means to plug loopholes and measures for strengthening regulatory mechanism of Federal and Provincial

Governments for transparency and compliance of relevant law. Since inception NAB constituted 69 prevention committees at NAB HQ and Regional Bureaus out of which 30 committees have been finalized and their recommendations have been forwarded to concerned quarters for implementation.

NAB have signed Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with different countries and entered in strategic partnership with other Anti-corruption agencies.

FATF Regime:

After FATF regime, parliament has approved a number of laws to regulate financial sector. Parliament has recently approved Mutual Legal Assistance Act 2020, which will enhance NAB capabilities to retrieve information related to corrupt elements from abroad.

Capacity Building:

NAB is also concentrating hard on the capacity building of its officers. Every year the Training and Research Division of NAB organizes comprehensive training programme for its investigation officers to enhance their capabilities and investigation techniques. In this regard NAB is also focusing on the training related to Anti-Money Laundering and Crypto currencies in order to deal with the upcoming ways and means of the corrupt elements to disguise their black money. NAB is actively collaborating in the field of training and operational activities with all the national and international organizations *i.e.* FIA, FMU, UNODC, AFP, NCA, USAID etc.

Will the Minister for Human Rights be please to state the name of authority / Government department at Federal level that maintains the record of cases related to human rights violation, including rape cases against women and girls across the country?

Mian Riaz Hussain Pirzada: At federal level, human rights violations including rape cases against women and girls are reported/registered by ICT Police Department, in terms of criminal offences. Accordingly, action is taken by Police against the persons involved in such cases. Moreover, National Police Bureau maintains data of all such cases.

The National Commission for Human Rights (NCHR) under the National Commission for Human Rights Act, 2012 is mandated to receive petitions or take suo-moto notices and investigate complaints of human rights all over Pakistan. The Commission accordingly maintains record of human rights violations including rape cases.

The Ministry of Human Rights has recently established Human Rights Complaint Cell for receiving, segregating and forwarding complaints of human rights violations both at federal and provincial levels. Through this system, MoHR generates an automated database concerning registration as well as tracking cases related to human rights violations.

MoHR also monitors print and electronic media besides identifying cases of human rights violations and referral of the cases to relevant authorities including law enforcement agencies for redressal.

MoHR's Toll-Free Helpline (1099) is also providing services to victims of human rights violations with regard to legal advice in such matters.

Will the Minister for Energy (Power Division) be pleased to state whether it is a fact that National Transmission and Dispatch Company (NTDC) has failed to pay compensation amount to the affectees of Neelum - Jehlum Transmission line in Muzaffarabad, AJK, if so, reasons thereof and steps taken / being taken for early payment of compensations to the affectees?

Mr. Khurrum Dastagir Khan: The compensation has been paid to all affectees in Muzaffarabad and nothing is outstanding as per record.

- (a) *the procedure and merit criteria laid down for the appointment of Registrar Supreme Court of Pakistan; and*
- (b) *whether the Federal cadre officer is eligible for appointment as Registrar, if so, under which rule / law?*

Mr. Azam Nazeer Tarar: (a) Under sub-rule 1 of rule 3 of the Supreme Court Establishment Service Rules, 2015, *“the appointments to the post in connection with the affairs of the Supreme Court, whether by initial recruitment, promotion, transfer or on deputation, shall be made in the prescribed manner by the Chief Justice or by a person authorized on his behalf”*.

Under the said rule, the criteria for appointment of Registrar, Supreme Court of Pakistan is as under:-

| Designation | BPS | Mode of appointment | Qualification & Experience |

| Registrar | 22 | Promotion/ Deputation Direct recruitment of a Member of the Bar/ known academician on contract for a period of 3 years terminable on one month's notice | Law Degree with 12 years standing |

(b) Yes, the Federal cadre officers are eligible for appointment on deputation, as Registrar, Supreme Court of Pakistan, under the aforesaid rule.
