**Minister Incharge of the Prime Minister's Office:** A mechanism/system under the ambit of Pakistan Citizen Portal (PCP) exists for the people to access/inform the Prime Minister for resolution of their issues/complaints and to avail speedy justice. By using the forum of Pakistan Citizen Portal, people can coordinate directly with the Prime Minister's Office and the line departments/offices for early resolution of their complaints. The Pakistan Citizen Portal has a total of 4,044,499 registered members/users who have lodged 5,004,647 complaints out of which 4,921,478 (98%) have been processed & closed as per relevant rules / laws and regulations. The Pakistan Citizen Portal has an overall 48% positive feedback from the citizen.

Sub: **SOP-2018 for Recruitment against Posts in BPS-1 to 15 and BPS-16 & above**

In pursuance of the "Recruitment Guidelines" notified by the Establishment Division, Cabinet Secretariat, Government of Pakistan, Islamabad, vide Office Memorandum No. F.53/1/2008-SP dated 22.10.2014, read with subsequent Office Memorandums dated 16.01.2015, 03.03.15 and 21.09.2017, the following SOP is to be adhered by all WAPDA formations for making recruitment in true letter and spirit against posts in BPS-1 to 15 and BPS-16 & above:

- a. As per Instructions of the Govt of Pakistan, service contract with a testing agency i.e M/S Pakistan Testing Services Islamabad has been signed, to conduct the written tests for recruitment in BPS-6 and above posts, initially for a period of one year w.e.f 02.01.2018.
- b. As per decision of the Authority notified vide office order No. DG/AD(E.IA)/7120/A/22293-442 dated 15.12.2017 recruitment in BPS-6 & above shall be processed through the office of DG (Recruitment).
- c. All posts in BPS-1 to 2 shall be filled through local domiciled candidates observing the quota for employees children, women, minorities and disable persons.
- d. Recruitment in BPS 1 to 5 shall continue to be made by respective projects authorities/ WAPDA formations through open advertisement after obtaining NOC/vetting from the office of DG (HR&Admn) WAPDA.
- e. For posts in BPS-1 to 5, the advertisement will be prepared by respective projects authorities/WAPDA formations and will be published through Directorate of Public Relations WAPDA after having been vetted by the office of Director General (Recruitment).
- f. For all posts in BPS-6 & above the draft advertisement will be prepared by the concerned WAPDA formation and it will be scrutinized/approved by the WAPDA Recruitment Cell in consultation with the Testing Agency. Applications on prescribed application form of Pakistan Testing Service on payment of Rs. 170/- will be submitted by the candidates to the Testing Agency.
- g. **Written Test:**

(i) For posts in BPS-16 and above an objective type written test shall be designed and conducted by Testing Agency in the following manner:

(ii) For posts in BPS-6 to 15 an objective type written test shall be designed and conducted by Testing Agency giving 20% weightage each to Islamic Studies, Pakistan Studies, English, General Knowledge and the Subject relevant to job.

(iii) There shall be no screening / written test for the posts in BPS-1 to 5 (as per Govt. Policy dated 03.03.2015 ref. above). However, the candidates shall have to qualify a particular skill test, (if) required for the said post.

- h. After conducting the written test, the Testing Agency shall prepare the result as per laid down contract agreement and shall hand it over to WAPDA Recruitment Cell as a signed document, to proceed further in the matter.
- i. After obtaining results from Testing Agency, a skill test for the posts in BPS-6 and above like Drivers, Junior Clerks/Typists, Stenographers, Data Entry Operators, Computer Operators etc. shall be conducted by the Recruitment Cell. The candidates shall have to qualify particular skill test as required for the post, before qualifying for further process.
- j. Top five (05) candidates would be short-listed for interview against each vacant post to be filled through fresh recruitment. Score in the Testing Agency test shall have 70% and the Interview shall have 30% weightage. The short listed candidates shall be interviewed after checking of original academic/professional credentials and testimonials to be brought by the candidates when called for interview.
- k. The Selection Board shall assess the applicants as under during interview:-
  - (i) Relevant qualification/experience - 30% weightage
  - (ii) Knowledge/skill relevancy - 40% weightage
  - (iii) Personality/Interpersonal communication skills - 30% weightage
- l. The competent authority shall constitute a Selection Board as per relevant service rules, which shall conduct interviews of the written test qualified candidates and make final selection. The following shall be observed as per new policy:
  - (i) GM HRD / DG Recruitment shall act as a Member of all the Selection Boards for recruitment against posts in BPS-17 and above.
  - (ii) A representative of the Recruitment Cell shall act as a Member for recruitment against all posts in BPS-6 to 16.
  - (iii) The competent authority / appointing authority shall remain the same as per prevailing service rules.
- m. After completing the process, the Convener of Selection Board shall send merit list to the competent authority, who after satisfying himself / herself of the proceedings shall refer the list to existing Monitoring Committee, TORs of which are being revised.
- n. Appointment letters to the successful candidates will be issued by the appointing authorities concerned as per relevant Rules.
- o. The validity / effectiveness of the waiting list of selected candidates for all posts in BPS-1 to 15 and BPS-16 & above will be valid upto 03 months only. Maximum of 25% candidates of the advertised posts with minimum of at least one (01) candidate will be eligible for consideration from the waiting list.

*Will the Minister Incharge of the Prime Minister's Office be pleased to state:*

- (a) the details of budget allocated to National Disaster Management Authority during the fiscal year 2022-23;*
- (b) whether it is a fact that said authority has not published its annual reports from 2018 to 2022, if so, reasons thereof;*
- (c) the key performance objectives achieved by the authority during the last five years; and*
- (d) the steps being taken by the Government for enhancing the performance of National Disaster Management Authority?*

**Minister Incharge of the Prime Minister's Office:** (a) Regular budget allocated to NDMA for the fiscal year 2022-23 is Rs. 362.6 Million. However, sum of Rs. 8 Billion has been allocated to NDMA for procurements in view of Monsoon Floods 2022.

(b) NDMA Annual Reports for the years 2018, 2019, 2020 and 2021 are already available on NDMA Website. Furthermore, NDMA Annual Report 2022 will be prepared and published after the conclusion of year 2022.

(c) Objectives achieved by NDMA during last 05 years are as under:-

1. **DISASTER RESPONSE AND COORDINATION.** From 2018 to 2021, NDMA has been managing multiple manmade and climate induced disaster to include heavy rains / snowfall, flash floods, hill torrents, glacial lake outburst floods, urban flooding, tropical cyclones and earthquakes in AJ&K, Balochistan and Gilgit Baitistan. In addition, NDMA was intimately involved in responding to two major national / international emergencies, locusts and COVID-19.

- a. **Monsoon Seasons 2018-2021.** Based on PMD forecast, monsoon contingency plans were prepared at national, provincial and district level. Monsoon Seasons 2018 to 2021 saw climate change induced impact ranging from flash floods, hill torrents, cloud bursts, glacial lake outburst floods (GLOF) to urban flooding with the latter being the most recurrent theme in recent years. Summary of losses and damages incurred during each year is as below:—

- (b) Measures undertaken are as follow:-

- i. National Monsoon preparedness meetings were held prior to onset of the season and contingency plans were issued to all stakeholders.
- ii. National Emergency Operations Centre (NEOC) and Army flood Control Centre (AFCC) were activated for round the clock monitoring of developing situation in the country.
- iii. Dissemination of weather alerts and warnings to communities in vulnerable areas to forewarn for safety measures.
- iv. Provision of helicopter support was coordinated with Pak Army as per emergency / requirement.
- v. Coordinated establishment of medical / relief camps with Armed forces as per requirement.
- vi. Relief provided by NDMA / PDMA / SDMA / GBDMA for Monsoon Seasons 2018 to 2021 is enclosed as below: -
  - (a) Monsoon 2018 - Annexure-A.
  - (b) Monsoon 2019 - Annexure-B.
  - (b) Monsoon 2020 - Annexure-C.
  - (c) Monsoon 2021 - Annexure-D.

- c. Apart from undertaking response to annual monsoon floods, response on following disasters was also undertaken: -
- i. Earthquakes - 31 January 2018. Two separate earthquakes affected areas of Balochistan and Khyber Pakhtunkhwa. Consequently, 2 x deaths, 19 x injured and 3 x houses damaged were reported. Rescue and relief operations were undertaken by respective PDMA's and NDMA coordinated the Armed Forces support.
  - ii. Karachi Heatwave - May 2018. On 17 May, PMD issued heatwave alerts for Karachi and surrounding areas. To mitigate the effects of heatwave, NDMA in collaboration with HANDS NGO and PDMA Sindh established 30 x Heatstroke Treatment Centres along with public awareness campaign.
  - iii. Formation of Shishper Glacial Lake - November 2018. GBDMA reported formation of Shishper Glacial Lake at Hasanabad due to blockage of natural waterflow in Hasanabad Nullah during the 3<sup>rd</sup> week of November. NDMA coordinated technical expertise and input from PMD, GSP, SUPARCO, WAPDA, Army Engineers, FWO and NESPAK. Subsequently, a Team of experts along with representatives from NDMA and GBDMA conducted field assessment to recommend preparedness and mitigation measures.
  - iv. Drought - November 2018 to January 2019. Based on rainfall data, 26 x districts of Sindh and Balochistan were declared as Drought Hit Areas by PMD, affecting 4.4 million population. NDMA prepared a comprehensive Drought Management Plan and ensured proactive monitoring of the situation in coordination with all relevant national and international stakeholders including UNOCHA. 6 x Working Groups co-chaired by federal ministries were established at federal level. Timely provision of food items and animal fodder was ensured till normalizing of situation.
  - v. Flash Flooding - March 2019. Heavy rainfall resulted in flash flooding in seven Districts of Balochistan (Kachhi, Pishin, Duki, Khuzdar, Barkhan, Gwadar and Lasbela) in March which reduced the effects of drought; however affected the major population in the area due to houses collapse resulting in loss of 10 lives and loss of 170 x livestock. In addition, 2 x bridges were also damaged. NDMA ensured immediate rescue and provided relief worth Rs 204.053 million included tents, blankets, plastic sheets, tarpaulins, water coolers and food packs.
  - vi. Shishper Glacier - June 2019. Shishper Glacial Lake remained largely in-tact since its formation in 2018. From May 19, increasing temperatures started opening natural drainage channels in the glacier. On 20 June, discharge from the lake began and continued until 22 June



where maximum outflow subsequently caused damage to the in-take chamber and channel of Hasanabad Hydro-power Project, eroded fruit orchards on both banks of Hasanabad Nullah, damaged KKH at two points and damaged drinking water supply channels for Hasanabad and Murtazabad. The lake was completely drained; however, due to preparedness & mitigation measures coordinated by NDMA and GBDMA, no loss of life occurred.

- vii. Cloudburst / Flash Flooding - July 2019. Cloudburst occurred in Leswa Village, District Neelum, AJ&K on 14<sup>th</sup> July 2019, causing 20 x deaths and 10 x injuries. 135 x houses, 2 x mosques, 8 x schools, 2 x BHUs, 10 x water mills, 14 x water supply schemes, 6 x bridges and 7 km of road were damaged along with loss of 56 x cattle head. NDMA coordinated helicopter rescue of the critical injured population and provision of early relief in shape tents and food through SDMA. Pak Navy and Pak Army divers were employed for search operation of the missing and dead persons. Rehabilitation of affected population was ensured in coordination with GoAJ&K and NGO.
- viii. Mirpur Earthquake - September 2019. An Earthquake of 5.8 magnitude hit parts of Districts Mirpur and Bhimber in AJ&K and Northern parts of District Jhelum, Punjab on 24<sup>th</sup> September 2019. Earthquake caused 41 x deaths, injured 746 x persons. 7,465 x houses, 141 x government buildings and 4 x bridges were also damaged. Response measures by NDMA are as follow: -
  - (a) Ex-Gratia Assistance, Rs 0.5 million each, to the next of kin / legal heir of the deceased was granted.
  - (b) Medical Teams of Pak Army and PIMS were coordinated and deployed in the affected areas.
  - (c) NDMA in collaboration with UNFPA & UNICEF established four Women and Child Friendly Centres (WCFC) in the area.
  - (d) NDMA deployed field teams to affected areas for initial assessment and coordination of relief activities.
  - (e) Details of major relief items provided by all NDMA are at **Annexure-E**.
- ix. Desert Locust Swarms - December 2019. Desert locusts threatened agricultural production in almost half of Pakistan (more than 60 districts of Pakistan, out of 154 districts) were affected. NDMA was declared lead agency for national coordination & procurement efforts against locust till establishment of National Locust Control Centre (NLCC). With the coordinated efforts of all stakeholders, including Department of Plant Protection (DPP), Provincial Agriculture Extension Departments, NDMA, PDMA's and Pakistan Army, the locust invasion was successfully combated with no major loss to crops.
- x. Heavy Snowfall / Avalanche - January 2020. Heavy Snowfall was reported in 7 x Districts of Balochistan (Quetta, Ziarat, Pishin, Killa Abdullah, Kachhi, Mastung and Harnai), KP (Lower Chitral, Upper Sir, Mansehra and North Waziristan), AJ&K (Bagh, Lasdara, Sodhan Gali,

Neelum) and GB (Gilgit, Diamer, Astore, Ghizer, Hunza, Nagar, Skardu, Ghanche, Shigar, Kharmand) from 11 - 14 January 2020. There had also been an avalanche in District Neelum AJ&K engulfing houses. The event resulted in loss of 27 x lives and injured 29 x persons. A total of 35 x houses were damaged. NDMA issued tents and other NFIs for disaster affectees. NDMA also coordinated Heli rescue in Manal, Nokkundi and District Chaghi.

- d. COVID-19. NDMA was assigned responsibilities of establishment of a supply chain, procurement of medical equipment, establishment of quarantine centers, construction of Infectious Diseases Hospital, oxygen capacity ramp-up of hospitals, provision of PPEs, ventilators and testing kits. NDMA successfully accomplished assigned responsibilities, while building a national reserve of essential medical items. Details of contributions of NDMA are as following: -
- i. Establishment of Quarantine Centers. NDMA established 2 x Quarantine centers; 1 x Haji Camp Islamabad and 1 x PIA Hotel Karachi. Further, NDMA provided 1200 x Container Rooms for use at land border crossings in Balochistan and Khyber Pakhtunkhwa.
  - ii. International Arrivals at Islamabad. Handling and quarantining inbound passengers in Islamabad at private hotels in coordination with Islamabad Local Administration.
  - iii. Construction and Operationalization of Isolation Hospital & Infection Treatment Centre (IHITC) Islamabad. IHITC was constructed and operationalized for COVID-19 patients within a record time of 40 days. NDMA operated the hospital through Public Private Partnership model for 6 months until December 2020 after which it was handed over to Ministry of National Health Services & Regulation.
  - iv. Establishment of Mass / Citizen Vaccination centers. To ensure smooth administration of COVID-19 vaccination, 11 x mass / citizen vaccination centers were established.
  - v. Handling of International COVID-19 Cargo. In light of the national emergency, NDMA handled logistics for 45 x international flights and 2 x cargo ships transporting essential medical equipment, medicines and personal protective equipment.
  - vi. Disinfection Operation. NDMA undertook disinfection operations of public buildings.
  - vii. Oxygenation Facility
    - (a) Installation in Hospitals. Critical Health Care facilities were installed in 22 x Hospitals across the country to oxygenate 2811 beds.
    - (b) ICU Beds. 1542 x ICU beds were distributed across the country.
    - (c) Oxygen Cylinder. 25176 x Oxygen Cylinders were distributed.

- viii. Humanitarian Assistance to Foreign Countries. Amid crisis situation of COVID-19, NDMA rendered humanitarian assistance (donation) to number of friendly countries.
- e. AIR CRASH - MAY 2020. PIA Flight crashed before landing at Jinnah International Airport Karachi on 22 May 2020. NDMA coordinated rescue operations with the active support of Armed Forces, Law Enforcement Agencies, Rescue Services and relevant authorities.
- f. HEAVY RAINFALL / LANDSLIDE - MARCH 2021. Due to heavy rainfall in AJ&K from 20 - 25 March 2021, a landslide occurred on Dhirkot, Khurshidabad and Brarkot roads. The event resulted in loss of 9 x lives besides injuring 4 x others. A total of 14 x houses and 13 x shops were damaged. NDMA issued tents, blankets, tarpaulins and first aid kits for distribution in affected areas besides coordinating helicopter sorties for rescue of critically injured.
- g. TROPICAL CYCLONE "TAUKTAE" - MAY 2021. Tropical Cyclone (TC) 'Tauktae' was forecasted to affect coastal areas of Karachi. On 17 May, it developed into Extremely Severe Cyclonic Storm (ESCS) having maximum wind speed of 120 knots, located 890 km SE of Karachi. None of coastal areas were directly impacted by the cyclone itself. However, 4 x persons were killed and 2 x were injured, besides 7 x roof collapse incidents caused by dust storm/rain, which hit parts of Karachi. 10 x TC alerts were issued, from 12 - 18 May 2021 to all stakeholders along with regular uploading on NDMA's website.
- h. SHISHPER GLACIER - MAY 2021. From second week of May 2021 temperatures abruptly started to rise throughout GB, which led to rapid opening of natural drainage channels under Shishper Glacier into Hasanabad Nullah. On 15 May 2021, water discharge from the lake began with complete discharge of the lake on 18 May 2021, at a peak of 8,500 cusecs. Due to proactive efforts of all stakeholders involved, preparation measures undertaken were implemented in a timely and streamlined fashion.
- i. TRAIN ACCIDENT - JUNE 2021. Two express trains collided between Raiti and Obaro railway stations in District Ghotki on 7<sup>th</sup> June 2021. The accident took place when 12 coaches of the Millat Express crashed into six bogies of Sir Syed Express. 62 x people were killed and 110 x people were injured. NDMA coordinated the rescue operation in collaboration with Pakistan Army and other DM stakeholders.
- j. HARNAI EARTHQUAKE - OCTOBER 2021. An earthquake of 5.9 magnitude at a depth of 15 km occurred on 7<sup>th</sup> October 2021 near Harnai, Balochistan. Response measures included: -
  - i. NDMA coordinated with PDMA Balochistan, Pak Army and FC Balochistan for rescue and relief operations.
  - ii. Special Urban Search and Rescue (USAR) team was airlifted in PAF C-130 for rescue operations in the affected areas. Furthermore, 5 x Army / FC Medical Teams were deployed in Harnai.
  - iii. Special helicopter evacuated 11 x critically injured person to CMH Quetta from Harnai, saving these precious lives.

- iv. A team headed by Chairman and Member operations with support staff, reached Harmai on 11<sup>th</sup> October 2021 for rapid need assessment after earthquake. On request of NDMA, the team was joined by the representatives of UNICEF, UNFPA, and NADRA for providing technical support.
- v. Through EHSAAAS Cash Distribution Programme, the Federal Government also disbursed Rs. 14000 per family amongst 15,398 registered households in the district.
- vi. Relief items (food packs, tents, blankets, tarpaulins and mosquito nets) were dispatched from NDMA warehouses in Quetta and Islamabad. Details are enclosed at **Annexure-F**.
- k. **GILGIT BALTISTAN (GB) EARTHQUAKES**. Gilgit-Baltistan was hit by five earthquakes and ten aftershocks between 27 and 28 December 2021. Though, there was no loss of life, however, approximately 4,500 houses were affected by the earthquake. Details of relief items provided are attached as **Annexure-G**.

## 2. **DISASTER RISK REDUCTION INITIATIVES**

Initiatives taken under Disaster Risk Reduction are as under:-

- a. **National Disaster Management Plan (NDMP) 2013 – 2022**. The NDMA in line with DRR Policy, has formulated a 10 Years' comprehensive NDMP in collaboration with Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA). The plan has various components of execution involving multiple stakeholders. Following are the key interventions under the NDMP: -
  - i. Establish institutional and legal system for DM.
  - ii. Prepare disaster management plans at various levels.
  - iii. Establish national hazard and vulnerability assessment.
  - iv. Establish multi-hazard early warning and evacuation systems.

Pakistan Rescue Team of Emergency Services Academy (Rescue 1122), Lahore received INSARAG Certification of the United Nations after completing an extensive evaluation process of several years under the supervision of UN-INSARAG mentors.

(d) The steps taken by the Government for enhancing the performance of NDMA are as under:-

- a. During 5<sup>th</sup> NDMC held under the chairmanship of Prime Minister on 28 March, 2018, subsuming of ERRa in to NDMA and subsequent amendments in NDM Act 2010 was approved. The process involved some legal aspects and is being addressed. Being mandatory requirement, so far, the Provincial Assemblies of Baluchistan and Khyber-Pakhtunkhwa have passed resolution in terms of Article 144. Accordingly, the case has been taken up with CCLC for approval of the Federal Government. The enhanced structure of NDMA will improve the overall performance of the Authority.
- b. The Federal Government from time to time assigned additional tasks to NDMA. Locust Control Operation, COVID19 Response, Vaccine Procurement and Storm Water Project for controlling urban flooding in Karachi under KTP are few examples.
- c. The Federal Government despite tight financial resources has always fulfilled budgetary requirement of the NDMA.
- d. The Federal Government has approved and consented number of national and international initiatives aiming disaster risk reduction and mutual collaboration.
- e. Directives from the Prime Minister of Pakistan, Involvement of Parliamentarians and top judiciary in the affairs / activities of the NDMA from time to time resulted improvement in the overall performance of the Authority.

*Will the Minister for Water Resources be pleased to state whether it is a fact that India has recently released 200,000 cusec of water in Ravi River, if so, the details of steps being taken by the Government to prevent flooding?*

**Syed Khursheed Ahmed Shah:** During the current monsoon season a flood alert was reported in Indian media regarding the release of 200,000 cusecs flow in river Ravi.

Pakistan Commissioner for Indus Waters (**PCIW**) approached the Indian Commissioner for Indus Waters (**ICIW**) on 31st July 2022 to validate the said news and asked to share the flow/discharge information in this regard to take preventive/mitigation measures in Pakistan.

The ICIW in his response, dated 1st August 2022, intimated about the flow of **140,000 cusecs**, likely to be released in river Ravi downstream of **Ujh Barrage** on river which is a right bank tributary of river Ravi. Later, however, the flows observed and reported by Pakistani Punjab Irrigation Department in river Ravi at Jassar were reported as **33,850 cusecs**.

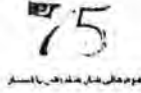
Similarly, in the second instance the information was shared by India on 15th August 2022 whereby it was intimated that the flow of **171,797** cusecs has been released downstream of Ujh Barrage in river Ravi.

The corresponding river flows observed and reported by Punjab Irrigation Department in Ravi at Jassar was 63,720 cusecs.

The information supplied by India was at the above two instances was shared by the office of **PCIW** with all the quarters concerned for taking preventive measures including flood forecasting Division, Federal and Provincial Flood Disaster and response agencies/Department etc.

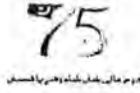

**Article IV (8):** The use of the natural channels of the Rivers for the discharge of flood or other excess waters shall be free and not subject to limitation by either Party, and neither Party shall have any claim against the other in respect of any damage caused by such use. **Each Party agrees to communicate to the other Party, as far in advance as practicable, any information it may have in regard to such extraordinary discharges of water from reservoirs and flood flows as may affect the other Party.**

*Will the Minister for Law and Justice be pleased to refer to Senate starred question No.34 replied on 22nd October, 2020 and state:*

- (a) *whether it is a fact that NAB has made plea bargain of Rs. 15 billion with the management of Eden Housing Society, Lahore, if so, the details thereof; and*
- (b) *whether any reimbursement has been made to the allottees who have deposited amount for allotment of plots by the said society, if not, the reasons thereof and the time by which the same will be made to them?*

**Mr. Azam Nazeer Tarar:** (a) On receipt of complaints from general public, a case was investigated against owners of M/s Eden Housing Limited by this Bureau, on the allegation of cheating 11880 x members of public at large / allottees of Housing projects of Eden Housing Limited and depriving them of their hard earned money of Rs. 13 Billion (Principal Amount). After completion of Investigation, Reference (ACR No. 64/2019) was filed before the learned Accountability Court Lahore against following accused persons:

- i. Dr. Muhammad Amjad
- ii. Mst. Anjum Amjad
- iii. Murtaza Amjad
- iv. Mustafa Amjad

It is further apprised that accused Dr. Muhammad Amjad and Anjum Amjad filed writ petition No. 36151/2021 before the Hon'ble Lahore High Court, Lahore to seek pre-arrest bails. During proceedings of Writ Petition, accused prayed that they want to enter into Plea Bargain u/s 25 (b) of NAO 1999, for which accused Dr. Muhammad Amjad has already submitted PB application to NAB and offered to pay off the liability. The Hon'ble Lahore High Court, Lahore, *vide* its Order dated 30-06-2021, directed the accused persons to establish their bona fide by making payment of an amount of Rs. 1000 Million to the NAB authorities within 4 weeks. Accused deposited the said amount of One Billion Rupees before NAB through Pay Orders. While the PB application of accused was

under process in this Bureau, the accused Dr. Muhammad Amjad died on 23-8-2021. After expiry of accused Dr. Muhammad Amjad, the accused Anjum Amjad submitted PB application dated 25-04-2022 for entering into Plea Bargain u/s 25 (b) of NAO, 1999 and offered to pay off the entire PB amount of Rs. 16 Billion (13 Billion principal amount + 3 Billion illegal gain) a period of 3 x years, as determined by NAB.

The Chairman NAB, considering facts and circumstance of the case, accepted the PB offer / request of the accused Mst. Anjum Amjad on 27-05-2022 and the same was approved by the learned Accountability Court Lahore on 06-06-2022. So far, Rs. One Billion (Down Payment) out of total PB amount of Rs. 16 billion, has already been recovered in compliance of aforesaid Orders of Honorable Lahore High Court. As per the terms and conditions of PB, approved by the learned Accountability Court, the remaining PB amount of Rs.15 Billion is to be paid in 11 x equal quarterly installments.

(b) No amount has been disbursed to the allottees affecttees of Eden Housing Limited as yet. Accused would pay first installment of PB amounting to Rs. 1.36 billion on or before 06-12-2022 (as approved by the learned Accountability Court), after which amount of Rs. 2.36 billion (Down Payment + 1st installment) will be paid / disbursed to the allottees / affecttees.

**Mufti Abdul Shakoor:** (a) ➤ Yes. The National Commission for Minorities (NCM), was reconstituted on 11-05-2020.

➤ The newly constituted NCM consists of six (06) official and Twelve (12) Non-official members. 10 out of 12 Non-official members belong to minorities with Mr. Chela Ram Kewlani as its Chairman who himself hails from *hindu* community. Details of members of NCM along with their religion and professional experience are at **Annex-I**.

(b) ToRs of National Commission for Minorities (NCM) are at **Annex-II**.

(c) ❖ Sixteen (16) meetings of the NCM have been held since 11-05-2020.

- ❖ NCM has prepared draft of the Interfaith Harmony Policy which is under consideration at Federal Cabinet.
- ❖ NCM has drafted Bill on National Commission for Minorities Act, 2022 which is under consideration at Federal Cabinet.
- ❖ NCM has considered/ recommended cases for disposal of communal properties under the Protection of Communal Properties of Minorities Ordinance, 2001.
- ❖ NCM has investigated incidents of alleged desecration of temples and made appropriate recommendations to the concerned authorities. These include incidences of discretion of Teri Samadhi Mandir and Bhong Mandir.
- ❖ Briefed Parliamentary Committee of Senate on Minorities Rights regarding alleged incidents of forced conversions/ marriages.
- ❖ NCM has met the President and Prime Minister of Pakistan to apprise them of performance of the Commission.
- ❖ Apart from holding meetings at Islamabad, the NCM decided to hold meetings at the provincial headquarters on 17-01-2022 and 21-22.03.2022 at Lahore and Karachi respectively. The last meeting of the NCM was held at Quetta to discuss issues/grievances/difficulties faced by the minorities communities in Balochistan province on 12-13.09.2022.
- ❖ Investigated the matters of attack on two priests of church of Pakistan at Peshawar and brutal murder of Sri Lankan citizen at Sialkot and made appropriate recommendations.

#### 4. **Response Measures**

- a. **Rescue.** Respective Local / District Administrations, Rescue Services, PDMAs / DDMA's and Armed Forces Formations have rescued approximately 720,000 persons till 20 October 2022. Armed Forces (Army, Navy and Air Force) also conducted Helicopter Sorties, rescuing approximately 20,000 persons.

d. **Establishment of NFRCC**

- (1) On the directions of the Hon'ble Prime Minister Islamic Republic of Pakistan, the National Flood Response Coordination Centre (NFRCC) was established on 1 Sep 2022 **to assess, plan, execute and coordinate various facets of response to current flood situation while synchronizing internal and international elements of relief efforts** besides provision of requisite preparatory foresight in the long run for introducing required resilience in national system/ infrastructure against such future disasters.
- (2) NFRCC is **headed by the Hon'ble Prime Minister** Islamic Republic of Pakistan with Minister for Planning, Development & Special Initiatives as its Deputy Chairman.
- (3) NFRCC is **acting as a bridge between Government Institutions, Disaster Management Authorities and donors** to ensure a seamless rehabilitation process for flood affectees all across Pakistan.
- (4) Terms of Reference for the NFRCC are as under: -
  - i. Interface with **international and bilateral donors** to **ensure availability of required relief and rehabilitation resources to enable national relief and rehabilitation effort**.
  - ii. Interface with INGOs to help integrate their efforts with overall national response.

- iii. Undertake required international / local **procurements of relief items**, as required.
- iv. Coordinate with PDMA's for **smooth conduct of relief operations by NFRCC**.
- v. Arrange and **coordinate visits of diplomatic community and foreign journalists** etc in coordination with concerned Ministries.
- vi. Collect and analyze latest information and share with relevant stakeholders for an apt response, **achieve optimum synergy** between Federal / Provincial Departments, Disaster Management Authorities, donors and Armed Forces by acting as a bridge.
- vii. Oversee and **ensure availability of required resources** to facilitate provincial efforts with respect to ongoing rescue operations.
- viii. Synchronize and synergize **collection efforts of relief items** from government departments, relief items collection points and other local donors.
- ix. Liaise and **coordinate receptions, packing and transportation of relief goods** obtained from international donors with NDMA.
- x. Identify **immediate relief needs of affected areas** in coordination with various stakeholders.
- xi. Organize a **comprehensive joint survey of affected areas** by multi-agency stakeholders to enable a merit-based provision of relief assistance.
- xii. **Oversee execution of finalized National Rehabilitation / reconstruction, plan** in synchronization with Federal / Provincial stakeholders with judicious allocation of resources to enable execution of various projects.
- xiii. Establish priority for revival / reconstruction of damage and destroyed national infrastructure.

**Minister Incharge of the Prime Minister's Office:** The expenditure of Prime Minister's House was gradually reduced from Rs. 509 millions (instead of Rs. 590 millions) in financial year 2017-18 to Rs.300 million (instead of Rs.280 million) in financial year 2020-21. The year wise reduction in expenditure is as under:

The reduction in budget/expenditure of Prime Minister's House during the period was in pursuance of austerity measures taken on a continuous basis. The single largest decline in expenditure was in "Pays & Allowances" to the extent of 55%. This reduced from Rs. 344.313 Million in 2017-18 to Rs. 228.658 Millions in 2020-21 (**Annex-I**).

The abolition/ surrender of non essential posts in the Prime Minister's Office (Public) and Prime Minister's Office (Internal) is an ongoing process since 2013. In 2013, in PMO (Public) 258 posts out of total strength of 494 posts were abolished. During the period 2018-19 to 2020-21, 152 posts were abolished/ surrendered in PM Office (internal) from total strength of 553 posts. It may be noted that posts surrendered were moved to the surplus pool of Establishment Division and thereafter to other Ministries. They remained on the payroll of the Federal Government and are being paid out of the Federal Budget. Further, expenditure on other aspects of the Prime Minister's movement/ travel etc. are met through the budget of the Islamabad Police and CDA.

It is added that following austerity measures issued by Federal Government/ Finance Division for the financial year 2022-23, are also being observed in the Prime Minister's Office:

- i. Consumption of utilities reduced by 10%.
- ii. Existing entitlement for POI- for government functionaries reduced by 30%.
- iii. Avoidable travel curtailed by promoting use of zoom/video links
- iv. Vacant/redundant/non-productive posts be abolished.
- v. POL usage of Ministers' vehicles slashed by 40% and security vehicles of Cabinet members reduced by 50%;
- vi. VVIP cavalcades' expense reduced without compromising security.

As per National Disaster Management Act 2010, Chapter II, Section 9, Para (a) & (c), NDMA is mandated to "Act as the implementing, coordinating, and monitoring body for disaster management" and "implement, coordinate and monitor the implementation of the national policy."

2. **Relief Efforts.** NDMA, PDMA's, Armed Forces (Army, Navy and Air Force), International Community and Humanitarian Organizations have distributed relief items including NFIs and Food Packs in affected areas. Main relief items include tents, tarpaulins, kitchen sets, mosquito nets, food / ration packs, dewatering pumps and limited quantity of medicines etc. Details of major relief items distributed is attached as **Annexure-A.**

- (b) such number of members not less than three, each of whom is or has been-
  - (i) a District Judge; or
  - (ii) a person who, for a period of not less than two years, has held a post in BS-21 or above or equivalent under the Federal Government or a Provincial Government with adequate quasi-judicial or legal experience, preference being given to a person having background of dealing with service matters; or
  - (iii) an Advocate qualified for appointment as Judge of a High Court.

2. Further, under Sub-section (4) of Section 3 of the said Act, the Chairman and Members of a Tribunal shall be appointed by the President for non-extendable term of three years on such terms and conditions as the President may determine.

3. Additionally, the Hon'ble Supreme Court of Pakistan *vide* para 50 of judgment titled "Sh. Riaz ul Haq Vs. FoP" reported as PLD 2013 SC 501, observed that the selection of Chairman and Members of the Federal Service Tribunal is to be made in consultation with the Chief Justice of Pakistan.   - (a) a Chairman, being a person who has been, or is qualified to be judge of a High Court;*
  - (b) such number of members not less than three, each of whom is or has been—*

- (i) *a District Judge; or*
  - (ii) *a person who, for a period of not less than two years, has held a post in BS-21 or above or equivalent under the Federal Government or a Provincial Government with adequate quasi-judicial or legal experience, preference being given to a person having background of dealing with service matters; or*
  - (iii) *an Advocate qualified for appointment as Judge of a High Court.*

**Mr. Musadik Masood Malik:** Sui Northern Gas Pipelines Limited (SNGPL) allows its staff to avail medical facility on reimbursement basis from all Government Hospitals/CM Hs/Armed Forces medical institutes and non-panel hospitals (at panel rates) all over Pakistan. Most of the panel hospitals are enlisted for all employees *i.e.* Executives and Subordinate staff to avail hospitalization services on credit basis. However, considering ratio of Executives and Subordinate Staff (19:81) *viz-a-viz* budgetary constraints, only six hospitals (*i.e.* three each in Lahore & Islamabad) are enlisted for executives. City wise detail of SNGPL panel hospitals is attached **Annex-I**.

- (a) *whether there is any proposal under consideration to review the agreement between the Government and K-Electric indicating the duration of the said agreement; and*

**Mr. Khurram Dastagir Khan:** (a) - Power Purchase Agreement with NTDC for supply of electricity of 650 MW from National Grid had expired on January 25, 2015. However, power supply still continues in line with the Sindh High Court order dated February 6, 2014.

- Pursuant to the CCOE decision dated 27-08-2020, draft Power Purchase Agency Agreement (PPAA) between KE and CPPA and draft Interconnection Agreement (ICA) between KE and NTDC are under deliberation.

(b) Subsequent to the privatization, KE does not receive any operational subsidy from the Federal Government however, subsidy to consumers is being provided by Federal Government through notification of consumer-end tariff being charged by all DISCO's including KE, which is usually lower than the tariff determined by NEPRA. The said difference between the tariff determined by the NEPRA and consumers-end tariff usually known as Tariff Differential Claims (TDC), is picked up by Federal Government in case of all DISCO's including KE, to provide relief to various categories of consumers across the Country.

**\*Question No. 5 Senator Mohsin Aziz:**

*Will the Minister for Water Resources be pleased to state:*

- (a) *the estimated time for completion of Mohmand Dam along-with cost details;*

**Syed Khursheed Ahmed Shah:** (a) • Planned completion date of MDHP is 21-12-2025. However, due to recent flood in River Swat on August 26, 2022, the scheduled completion of the diversion scheme may be delayed and affect the overall completion of the project.

- As per PC-I approved by ECNEC on 26-04-2018, the cost of the Project is Rs. 309,558.38 Million.

(b) As intimated by WAPDA, flood of 26.08.2022 has caused the following damages to Mohmand Dam Hydropower Project (MDHP):

- Diversion Tunnels Inlet Protection dyke overtopped and completely submerged.
- Diversion Tunnel-1 Inlet Portal slope damaged due to land slide.
- Huge debris inflow in Diversion Tunnel.
- Diversion Tunnels Outlet Protection dyke overtopped.
- Concrete Lining Shuttering & Working Steel Platform of Diversion Tunnel-2 flushed out from the Diversion Tunnel Outlet Portal.

The contractor along with Insurance company is determining the estimated cost of the damages due to flood.

- (c) • In the wake of the damages caused by the recent floods of 2022 at Mohmand Dam Project, the contractor has revised the design with 2 layers of protection dykes instead of 1 layer to achieve more safety to permanent works of the Diversion Tunnels.
- The contractual completion date of the Project is 21-12-2025. However, due to flood damages mentioned above, the scheduled completion time of the river diversion scheme will be extended, which may delay the overall completion of the Project up to 10 months.
