(*Def.*) *Question No. 6 **Senator Mushtaq Ahmed:** (Notice Received on 22/08/2022 at 4:25 PM) QID: 39654

Will the Minister for National Food Security and Research be pleased to state:

- (a) comparative details of federal excise duty and retail prices of locally manufactured and cigarettes and imported cigarettes;
- (b) the steps being taken for protection of local tobacco industry against the multinational tobacco companies in the country; and
- (c) the steps being taken for enhancing the market shares of local tobacco companies in Pakistan?

Mr. Tariq Bashir Cheema: (a) Tobacco Industry has been subjected to Sales Tax @17% on retail price. Tobacco Industry is chargeable to Federal Excise Duty (FED) in term of Sr. No. 09 and 10 of First Schedule to the Federal Excide Act, 2005. FED on cigarette is imposed on multi-tier basis on the basis of retail price since 12-06-2013. Rates of FED have been enhanced from time to time. The details of FED imposed per thousand cigarettes from 01-07-2021 are attached as Annex-A.

Imported Cigarettes are subject to Sales Tax @17%. FED is chargeable @ 65% of retail price (as prescribed in S.No.9 of schedule

whichever is higher) on imported cigarettes in terms of S.No.8 to First Schedule to the Federal Excise Act, 2005.

The details of retail prices of the tobacco products, the retail prices of locally manufactured cigarettes as received from top tobacco companies of Pakistan is attached as **Annex-B**.

- (b) All tobacco companies either local or multinational have equal chance to indicate their requirement as per their own financial resources. M/o NFS&R and its attached department *i.e.* Pakistan Tobacco Board (PTB) does not engage in any commercial or trading activity or providing any financial support or facility to any tobacco company engaged in tobacco business. PTB provides equal opportunity to all players in the tobacco market as per law.
- (c) M/o NFS&R and its attached department *i.e.* PTB has no role in allocating market share to any tobacco company either multinational or local. Every tobacco company in Pakistan, operates its business regarding sale purchase of tobacco or cigarette manufacturing as per their own resources.

Mr. Tariq Bashir Cheema: (a) Production, consumption and shortfall of wheat during the current year is reported as:

Initially a shortfall of 3 MMT was assessed. Later on, after the re-verification of carry-forward stocks and stock position the net shortfall was reported at the level of 2.60 MMT. Source: CRS, PASSCO and Provincial Food Departments.

- (b) Government is committed to announce the profitable support price before the next wheat sowing season. In this context following steps are being taken to announce a uniform support price of wheat 2022-23:
 - 1. API has worked out cost of production of wheat crop.
 - 2. Meeting of Wheat Board was convened on 30-06-2022 to sensitize provincial governments on the issue of support price of wheat.
 - 3. Follow up letters were sent to provinces on 23-06-2022, 13-07-2022,03-08-2022 and 19-07-2022, with the request to submit endorsement of their respective Cabinets.
 - 4. API arranged a consultative meeting on wheat crop with all stakeholders.

- Cost of production was circulated among all stakeholders on 05-09-2022.
- 6. A meeting of Agriculture Task Force was convened in the PM Office on 15-08-2022 and a Sub-Group was constituted to formulate recommendations on wheat crop.
- 7. A meeting under the Chairmanship of the Federal Minister for NFS&R was convened on 26-08-2022, wherein provinces were re-emphasized to submit the endorsement of their Cabinets.

Subject of the Question Will the Minister for National Food Security and Research be pleased to state the current progress and steps taken so far under the Prime Minister's National Agriculture Emergency Program for the uplift of farmers across the country?

Reply of the Question

National Minister's Under the Prime Agriculture Emergency Program three mega projects have been launched with a total cost of Rs. 13.7 billion in which a subsidy of Rs. 5.7 billion is being provided to fish farmers. processors, feed millers and marginalized peoples connected with the sector. These projects aim to promote aquaculture-based seafood production to ensure local supplies and surplus for export from Pakistan and to harness the untapped potential of fisheries natural resources to create livelihood opportunities and economic uplift of fish farming communities. It is anticipated that on the completion of these projects, Pakistan would be able to export farmed shrimp and fishery products with a substantial increase in the foreign exchange earnings in next five years.

Shrimp farming is a new activity in Pakistan but have a great potential having conducive environment. The following is the current progress of the "Pilet Shrimp Farming Cluster Development Project":

- The 293 Farmers and 25 extension workers have been trained from all over Pakistan.
- 2 Training manual has been distributed in the farmers.
- The civil work of Model shrimp farm at PD khan, Punjab is under progress.
- The civil work of Shrimp Hatchery at Daam Lasbela, Balochistan is under progress.
- Workshops have been conducted at Karachi and Lahore on promotion of shrimp farming and export development in Pakistan.
- Givil work for construction of Saline Water Aquaculture Research Center is in progress at Muzaffargarh, Punjab.
- 7. Oivil work almost completed for up gradation of training center and hostels at Rawalpindi and Bahawalpur, Punjab and the building will be completed till the end of next year.

Government has initiated another project is "Promotion Of Trout Farming In Northern Areas Of Pakistan" under this project:

- 1. Establishment of 4 New Trout Fish Hatcherles in GB,AJK and KPK in progress.
 - Renovation and upgradation of 20 existing Trout Hatcheries in GB,KP and AJK in progress.
 - Establishment of Ooldwater Research and Training Center in progress.
 - 4 Establishment of New Trout Farms
 - 196 No. Fish farms are provided support in Gilgit-Baltistan.
 - 181 No. Fish Farm are constructed out of 287 on 50:50 Cost share basis.
 However, floods have damaged some of the farms.
 - 11 No. Trout Fish Farm are constructed in AJ&K on 80:20 cost share basis.

- Distribution of Local and imported
 Trout Feed among Trout Fish Farmers
 - 183 No. Fish Farmers
 (Local Feed)
 - 185 No Fish Farmers (Imported feed)
- 6. Enhancement of Eco-tourism
 - 03 No. Fishing Angling tournaments have been arranged for the promotion of Eco-tourism
- 7. Training and Capacity building
 - 450 No. of person from public and private sector has been trained in three regions (KP, GB and AJ&K)

The Government has initiated another project "Cage Culture Cluster Development Project" to utilize abundantly available natural water resources by introducing cage culture technology in freshwater and marine waters that would result in increase and upscaling of livelihood and job creation for

rural people, increase per capita fish consumption and export earnings from cage aquaculture.

Three model cage farms have been established in Punjab, Sindh and Baluchlstan and 1000 cage units have been installed 464 Fish Farmers and extension workers in Cage Culture Cluster Development Project throughout the Pakistan.

Will the Minister for National Food Security and Research be pleased to state:

- (a) the number and percentage of farmers associated with small farming in Pakistan;
- (b) the reported losses suffered by small farmers during the recent floods; and
- (c) the steps being taken for rehabilitation of small farmers affected by the recent floods?

Mr. Tariq Bashir Cheema: (a) 90 percent of overall farmers (7.4 million) are categorized as smallholder farmers in Pakistan who own less than 12.5 acres of land.

- b) Preliminary losses suffered by the farmers are around Rs.529.1 billion as reported by the provinces.
- (c) The main exercise to rehabilitate the flood affected people is being done by the Ministry of planning, Development and reforms along with development partners *i.e.* World Bank, agricultural Development Bank, FAO and the UN agencies.
 - M/o NS&R has proposed for distribution of wheat seeds and oilseeds to support flood affected areas. According to provincial estimates about 4.07 million acre damaged due to recent floods. Most of the damage occurred in sindh and Balochistan followed by Punjab and KPK.
 - To give 100% coverage to support farmers for wheat seeds an amount of Rs. 20.54 billion will be required. It was proposed that Federal & Provincial governments will share the cost with 50:50. However, Consent of the Provinces for sharing of cost is still awaited.
 - Meanwhile, Federal government has arranged Rs. 8.00 billion from its own development project for the provision of wheat seed. Mechanism for disbursement of seed is being finalized.

Will the Minister for National Health Services Regulations and Coordination be pleased to state the steps taken by the Government to provide House Jobs to freshly graduated MBBS students in ICT?

Mr. Abdul Qadir Patel: The hospital wise reply is as under:

(a) Federal Government of Polyclinic (Postgraduate Medical Institute) FGPC.

(i) Federal Government Polyclinic (PGMI), Islamabad has 68 sanctioned seats of paid House Job training. However, as per recommendations of Pakistan Medical Commission, this hospital is allowed to induct up to 105 House Officers.

The selection criteria is as follows.

House Officer are inducted in Federal Government Polyclinic (PGMI) after duly Advertisement in press media. The eligibility criteria for house job training is as under:—

- ➤ MBBS degree or equivalent & Marks Sheet.
- Valid temporary registration with PM&DC/PMC.
- National Identity Card.

The candidates fulfilling the above mentioned criteria are undergo following mentioned procedure:-

- > 50% marks for written test scores.
- ➤ 25% marks for academic career (4% Matric + 6% Intermediate + 15% MBBS)
- > 25% marks for interview.

It is pertinent to mention that as per direction of Honorable Supreme Court of Pakistan paid slots are offered to graduates of Public Sector Colleges whereas, private sector graduate and foreign Medical Graduates are offered House Job on the condition that they will submit an affidavit/undertaking at the time of interview affirming that he/she will not claim any pay/stipend from this institute rather will either demand that from his/her parent Medical College or is ready to undertake house job at FGPC (PGMI), if selected, purely on volunteer basis.

(b) Pakistan Institute of Medical Sciences (PIMS):

As per rules & regulations of Pakistan Medical Council (PMC) and order passed by the Honorable Supreme Court of Pakistan; every Medical & Dental Colleges in Pakistan shall be responsible to provide a paid house job at its own or affiliated teaching hospital to all of its graduates who have acquired a provisional license.

Failure to provide a house job shall result in the medical & dental colleges re-imbursing the stipend paid to the graduates by the training hospital where the graduate obtains house job training.

It is pertinent to mention here that PMC Act, 2021 and judgment of the Honorable Supreme Court of Pakistan is being followed in letter & spirit.

(c). National Institute of Rehabilitation Medicine (NIRM).

The National Institute of Rehabilitation Medicine (NIRM) is a tertiary care hospital for persons with disabilities for their long term rehabilitation and treatment. Furthermore, NIRM does not offer House Job in any category as it has not been declared as teaching Hospital.

(d). Federal General Hospital (FGH), Islamabad.

The Federal General Hospital (FGH), Islamabad is a secondary care hospital and does not offer House Job in any category.

Will the Minister for National Health Services, Regulations and Coordination be pleased to state whether it is a fact that the Pakistan Institute of Medical Sciences has recently obtained license from the Human Organ Transplant Authority for kidney transplant, if so, tentative deadline for starting up kidney transplant in PIMS?

Mr. Abdul Qadir Patel:

- It is informed that PIMS submitted, renewal of transplant license along with pending dues of Rs. 600,000/- in favor of HOTA and they have accepted our application for renewal of transplant license (Annex-A).
- As per HOTA letter No.F.No.3-1(1)/PIMS/Kidney/08/01 dated 29th July, 2022, the final approval of kidney transplant is pending on the detailed inspection / scrutiny of HOTA Administrator. As per requirements of HOTA, it is subject to completion and availability of Kidney Transplant team of PIMS/FMTI.
- The interviews of Transplant Surgeons were conducted by Selection Board of PIMS/FMTI where Dr. Nadir Hussain has been selected as Associate Professor and Dr. Obaid Ullah as Assistant Professor. Both are working as active kidney transplant surgeons at Sheikh Zayed Teaching Hospital, Lahore. If they accept the offer of appointment PIMS will be able to utilize their expertise.
- Furthermore, for the kidney transplant, program, PIMS has plan to establish a transplant unit comprising of the 8-12 bedded in near future. The whole process is bound to take at least 8-12 weeks approximately.

Will the Minister for National Health Services, Regulations and Coordination be pleased to state:

- (a) whether there is any proposal under consideration of the government to utilize the medicinal plants in different areas of Pakistan for medicinal use, if so its details; and
- (b) the details of authority that conducts such research on medicinal properties of plants for therapeutic purposes?

Mr. Abdul Qadir Patel: (a) National Council for Tibb within its limited Resources with Collaboration of Qarshi Herbs Research Centre has carried out efforts by preparing Monograph of 185 common herbs describing its Botanical, English and Urdu nomenclature. The information given in the monographs are about the plant, part used and Botanical identification which will be made part of National Unani and Ayurvdhic Pharmacopeia.

- (b) (i) There is no authority for conduct of research with special reference to medicine plants. However, Pakistan Health Research Council (now HRI) has the mandate to facilitate the research proposals; provide assistance, approval and funding for research either on allopathic or traditional plants for therapeutic purposes.
 - (ii) Pakistan Council of Scientific and Industrial Research (PCSIR) has recently authorized issuance of license for cultivation and quality control of hemp (Cannabis) for medical purposes.

Will the Minister for National Health Services, Regulations and Coordination be pleased to state the progress work made on the two under construction Government hospitals in sector G-11 and Tarlai, Islamabad and the time by which the said hospitals will be completed?

Mr. Abdul Qadir Patel:

(1) <u>Jinnah hospital (ex-name Establishment of Federal</u> Government Polyclinic

- The project was approved by CDWP on 29-11-2021 at a total cost of Rs. 9,9913.730 million. The Infrastructure Development Authority of Punjab (IDAP), Lahore is the executing agency with the approval of Cabinet on turn-key basis. The site is handed over to IDAP, with the approval of cabinet on turn-key basis. This project is being funded through Public Sector Development Programme (PSDP). An amount of Rs. 1500.00 million has been allocated in the CFY 2022-23. The IDAP has awarded the work to a Chinese contractor and the work at site is in progress.
- ❖ The said hospital will be completed during CFY 2023-24.

2. <u>King Salman Bin Abdul Aziz Al Saud Hospital at Tarlai Islamabad.</u>

- ❖ The subject hospital was approved by CDWP on 2-12-2015 at cost of Rs. 2,499.990 million. The boundary wall of the compact plot has been contracted. Gates have also been installed. Approach roads have been laid, Consultant has been hired by Saudi Fund for Development (SFD) with a total amount of Saudi Rial 5.995 million. Accordingly, agreement was signed on 17-11-2022.
- ❖ The said hospital will be completed in FY 2025-26.

Will the Minister for National Health Services, Regulations and Coordination be pleased to state whether there is any proposal under consideration for extension of Polyclinic Hospital Islamabad if so details indicating progress made thereon and tentative completion date thereof?

Mr. Abdul Qadir Patel: Yes, after cancellation of adjacent piece of land of Argentina Park acquired for extension of FGPC by the Honorable Islamabad High court. The CDA allocated 5 acres plot in G-11/3, Islamabad for said extension of FGPC-II. CDWP was approved the project for construction of 300 bedded "Jinnah Hospital (ex-name Establishment of Federal Government Polyclinic (PGMI)-II at Rs. 9,913.730 million on 29-11-2021, in next three (03) years. The infrastructure Development Authority of Punjab (IDAP) Lahore is the executing agency for the said project.

The Infrastructure Development Authority of Punjab (IDAP) Lahore arranged ground breaking of the said project on 21-03-2022 and after processing of international tendering work has been awarded to a Chinese contractor and they have assured for physical work on site is expected to commence shortly and will be completed within the approved time frame.

*Question No. 16 **Senator Mushtaq Ahmed:** (Notice Received on 20/12/2022 at 9:22 AM) QID: 40035

Will the Minister for National Food Security and Research be pleased to state whether it is a fact that recent floods in the country have adversely affected the agriculture sector which may cause wheat insecurity / shortage during the coming harvesting seasons, if so, the steps being taken for avoiding shortage of wheat during the said period?

Mr. Tariq Bashir Cheema: During the time of rainfall & flash floods wheat crop was completely harvested and stored in public premises and in open spaces in a well-organized and scientific manner. However, damage to small quantities has been reported by PASSCO and Sindh Food Department. Government is endeavoring to enhance its storage facilities to preserve the maximum quantum of wheat.

It is expected that there would be no wheat insecurity/ shortage in the country. However wheat has been imported in different quantities to maintain National Strategic Reserves.

Mr. Bilawal Bhutto Zardari: Pakistan acceded to the following three multilateral Conventions/Protocols during the last four years, which have also been acceded to, by India:

- Pakistan acceded to the 'Hague Convention Abolishing the Requirement of Legislation for Foreign Public Documents (Apostille Convention) of 1961' on 16 June 2022. India acceded to the Apostille Convention on 26 October 2004.
- Pakistan acceded to the 'Convention on the Protection and Promotion of the Diversity of Cultural Expressions (2005)' on 04 March 2022 which entered into force on 04 June 2022. India acceded to the Convention on 15 December 2006.

• Pakistan acceded to the 'Additional Protocol to Prevent, Suppress and Punish Trafficking in Persons especially Women and Children, supplementing the United Nations Conventions against Transnational Organized Crime (TIP Protocol-2000)' on 04 November 2022. India acceded to the TIP Convention on 05 May 2011.

Will the Minister for Foreign Affairs be pleased to state the details of multilateral / bilateral agreements signed between India and Pakistan during the last four years?

Mr. Bilawal Bhutto Zardari: In the last four years, relations between Pakistan and India have been marred by a number of provocative steps by India. Presently, diplomatic relations between the two countries are limited and people-to-people exchanges are at a minimal level. Despite the current difficulties in the relationship, two agreements have been signed during the last four years:

Kartarpur Corridor - October 24, 2019

In keeping with Pakistan's abiding commitment to facilitate religious harmony and building interfaith relations, Pakistan signed the

Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with India to open the Kartarpur Corridor on October 24, 2019. The corridor was termed as the 'Corridor of Peace' by the UN Secretary General Antonio Gueterres. Nearly 5,000 pilgrims are now able to visit the holy sites on a daily basis, without the need for visa. The Kartarpur Corridor was inaugurated on November 9, 2019.

Ceasefire along LoC - February 25, 2021

Another significant bilateral understanding is the Directors General of Military Operations (DGMO) understanding of February 2021. The Understanding was announced on February 25, 2021 through a joint statement issued after consultations between the DGMOs of both Pakistan and India. Discussions were held over the established mechanism of hotline contact. Before this understanding was entered into, the two countries had a previous ceasefire understanding in 2003 which was violated by India 13,500 times, leading to the death of 310 citizens and injuring at least 1,600.

*Question No. 20 **Senator Kamran Murtaza:** (Notice Received on 29/12/2022 at 4:12 PM) QID: 40131

Will the Minister for National Food Security and Research be pleased to state:

- (a) the existing demand, consumption and production of olive oil in the country; and
- (b) whether there is any olive cultivation policy in the country, if so the steps being taken for increasing the production of olive under the said policy?
- **Mr. Tariq Bashir Cheema:** (a) The existing demand and consumption of edible oil in the country is 4.042 million ton. The production of edible oil in the country is 0.471 million ton.
- (b) Currently there is no olive cultivation policy in Pakistan however, Olive policy is being prepared by an advisory group constituted under the Italian funded "Olive Culture project" through consultation with the Italian and local olive experts.

The local production of olive oil still in its infancy and as per the available data, across the country, an estimated 104 tons of olive oil was produced last year and 4,321 ton olive oil was imported. As more plantations mature and start bearing fruit/olive oil production will increase exponentially.

The government is promoting olive cultivation through PSDP project namely "Promotion of Olive Cultivation on Commercial Scale in Pakistan (Phase-II). Steps taken under this project are:

- Commercialized olive farming on 75,000 acres and provision of 10.125million Olive plants to grower on 67:33 sharing basis.
- Survey and identification of wild olive pockets and top working of five million wild olive.
- Provision of Drip irrigation system on 5,000 acres- on 67:33 sharing basis in rainfed and marginal lands.
- Provision of 4 solar powered tube-wells on public lands.
- Geo Tagging and mapping of sites.
- Human resource development and training on olive culture involving youth and gender.
- Public private cooperation for oil processing and value addition.

Will the Minister for Communications be pleased to give the details of the collapse / damages of the roads and bridges on National Highways and action taken against the concerned contractors, consultant and responsible functionaries of NHA, and reasons for acquittal of the accused since 2015?

Mr. Asad Mahmood: No bridge structure has been damaged/collapsed since 2015, therefore, no action has been taken against any Consultant, Contractor and responsible functionaries of NHA.

During flood 2022, about 46 bridges and 497 km length of national highways were partially damaged / collapsed due to unprecedented heavy rainfall and subsequent flash floods. In addition to this, the road damages are also caused due to combined effects of overloading, aging and weathering. The deterioration of road Infrastructure is a continuous process and the maintenance / repair / rehabilitation works are carried out through systematic approach within available financial resources.

- (a) the details of the Housing societies located in Islamabad Capital Territory to which interchange and access from Sri Nagar Highway and Motorway (M-2) has been provided till now; and
- (b) whether it is a fact that E-Eighteen, G-15, Fasil Town, New Tableeghi Markaz and H-17 have not been provided access / interchange from Sri Nagar Highway and Motorway (M-2), if so, reasons thereof and if so, the tentative deadline for provision of the said facilitation /access to the said societies?
- **Mr. Asad Mahmood:** (a) None of the Housing Societies located in Islamabad Capital Territory (ICT) have been granted NOC for construction of interchange and access from Sri Nagar Highway/Link Road and Motorway (M-2) till now.
- (b) All the said Housing Societies/entities have not been granted NOCs for construction of interchanges from Sri Nagar Highway/Link Road and Motorway (M-2) due to non-fulfilment of the Criteria of 10-KM distance from existing Interchanges as provided in NHA Regulations for Access from NHA Controlled Network -2019 that:

"Provided except for requirement of GOP for national interest, NHA shall not allow interchange for access to (or) from motorway/ expressway/link road within 10 KMs of an existing interchange on the motorway/ Expressway/ Link Road."
